Description: Fundamentals of writing for the mass media. Includes instruction in professional methods and techniques for gathering, processing, and delivering content.

The first half of the semester will concentrate on the basics of news and reporting as well as online news writing. The second half will concentrate on broadcast news writing.

Course Requirements: Students should attend all class/ lab meetings and complete all assignments.

Absence Policy: Students are expected to attend all classes and labs in order to be successful in this course.

I'm sure there will be multiple reasons why you might be absent this semester this semester, such as quarantine, isolation, illness, an official trip authorized by the college or an official activity.

Please do **NOT** assume that I will contact you to tell you about missed work. It's safe to assume there will be multiple classwork assignments each day of class. You may or may not be allowed to do "makeup" depending on the length and reason for your absence and supporting documentation.

<u>Do NOT assume that I will move deadlines for you unless you contact me</u> and offer acceptable reasons why you cannot meet them.

In the event that you miss an exam, you must notify me within 48 hours about why. You may or may not be able to "make up" the missed exam. If you miss an exam due to COVID-19, you will take the exam the day you return.

Deadlines: The assignments in this class will be deadline driven. You must keep track of deadlines and submit work when it is due.

ALL deadlines are absolute. You need to get used to deadlines that exist in the off-campus world. All assignments will be due at the beginning of each class. Late assignments may be penalized harshly if they are accepted at all.

Excuses: Don't bother to try any. I've heard most of them and have used some of them myself. Only deaths of immediate family members (parents, grandparents, siblings – ONLY), or your own, may be considered for an excused absence. Of course, you will need to provide proof (such as the obituary notice). Student athletes or those participating in other college-sponsored activities that require an absence, will be excused, with prior notice to me and appropriate documentation.

<u>Withdrawal Policy</u>: The last day to withdraw/drop with a grade of "W" is Dec. 2. It is the student's responsibility to withdraw from this course. Otherwise, students will be assigned their earned letter grade at the end of the course. Course averages will be updated frequently, and guidance will be provided throughout the term to help students decide whether they need to drop the class or not. Students are officially enrolled in all courses for which they pay tuition and fees at the time of registration. Should a student, for any reason, delay in reporting to a class after official enrollment, absences will be attributed to the student from the first class meeting.

Students who enroll in a course but have "Never Attended" by the official census date, as reported by the faculty member, will be administratively dropped by the Office of Admissions and Records.

Tardiness Policy:

I enforce a 5-minute rule tardiness rule. I use the clock in the classroom or on my computer to check the time. You may come to class **up to** 5 minutes late. That's the cutoff. If you arrive **after** that 5-minute window, you'll be given one warning. The next time you arrive to class past the 5 minute window, you'll be asked to turn leave. I may or may not have taken attendance already if you arrive 5 minutes late. It's up to you to make sure you are marked present.

Academic Integrity

It is the aim of the faculty of South Plains College to foster a spirit of complete honesty and a high standard of integrity. The attempt of any student to present as his or her own any work which he or she has not honestly performed is regarded by the faculty and administration as a most serious offense and renders the offender liable to serious consequences, possibly suspension.
