Course Description: Origin and development of the Texas constitution, structure and powers of state and local government, federalism and inter-governmental relations, political participation, the election process, public policy, and the political culture of Texas.

Course Objectives addressed:

- 1. **critical thinking:** to include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation, and synthesis of information.
- 2. **communication:** to include effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication.
- 3. **social responsibility:** to include intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities.
- 4. **personal responsibility:** to include the ability to connect choices, actions, and consequences to ethical decision-making.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Students who have completed this course will:

- 1. Explain the origin and development of the Texas constitution.
- 2. Describe state and local political systems and their relationship with the federal government.
- 3. Describe separation of powers and checks and balances in both theory and practice in Texas.
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of Texas government.
- 5. Evaluate the role of public opinion, interest groups, and political parties in Texas.
- 6. Analyze the state and local election process.
- 7. Identify the rights and responsibilities of citizens.
- 8. Analyze issues, policies and political culture of Texas.

Student Learning Outcomes Assessment: A writing assignment rubric will be used to determine the extent of improvement that the students have gained during the semester.

<u>Additional Reading Materials</u>: Instructor will provide additional readings from a variety of sources including current event articles. Readings will be made available to students electronically when possible.

<u>Course Structure</u>: This online course will include supplemental videos, handouts, assignments, quizzes, and tests. All materials, including the class required textbook, will be accessible through Blackboard.

Attendance: Regular attendance is mandatory; attendance will be taken each class. It is in **your best interest** to attend class regularly and on time. Material that will be covered in class goes beyond the assigned reading and many questions that will be on exams come exclusively from lectures rather than just the book. If you miss a class, **you and you alone** are responsible for finding out what you missed from a classmate buddy or from what is posted on Blackboard. I do not repeat lectures in office hours or provide PowerPoints online. An absence is defined as failing to attend class, missing 15 or more minutes of class, or leaving class without the instructor's approval. Additionally, a student accrues an absence each time he or she accumulates a total of three late arrivals (i.e. 5+ minutes late). Whenever feasible, students should let the instructor know about expected absences as soon as possible.

Students who have approved absences for athletic or other school approved activities should provide a schedule within the first two weeks. Students who miss classes or exams due to verifiable circumstances such as medical emergencies should provide the documentation to the professor or facilitator as soon as they return to classes.

Student Performance: You must maintain your standards throughout the duration of the semester. There will be no extra credit and there will be little time for playing "catch-up." If you fail three (3) consecutive assignments or reading quizzes, you will be dropped from the class with a failing grade with no further warning. If you repeatedly fail to submit required work on time, you may be dropped from the class at the discretion of the instructor. You must attend class in person and complete Quiz 1 by January 29, 2025, the census date, or you will be automatically dropped from the course.

GENERAL POLICIES

- **Behavior:** Students are expected to be considerate of one another as well as of the instructor. In the words of the late Molly Ivins, "It really is possible to disagree with someone's policies without hating them. Grown-ups can do that." Conduct that interferes with other students' right to learn will not be tolerated.
- ❖ Getting help: Please email me if you have any problems with readings, lecture, or assignments. If you are having difficulty of any kind the earlier you ask for help, the easier the solution to your problem will be. I cannot help if I am unaware. When emailing, please be sure to include your full name, the course number, and section number in the subject line of your email. Ex. GOVT 2306-003; the course number is 2306, the section number is 003.
- ❖ Academic Honesty: Honesty is the expected standard. Plagiarism and cheating (copying answers from an outside source or another student, using AI to generate work) will not be tolerated and can be grounds for dismissal from South Plains College. Incidents of cheating on examinations will result in failure of the course and potential consequences such as dismissal from South Plains College.
- ❖ AI (artificial intelligence): If I suspect that a student has submitted artificially generated discussions, assignments, or test answers, I will provide sources of AI detection before requesting a conference. Whether you attend class in-person or online, you will be required to meet with me via video conference where you will be given the opportunity to respond verbally to questions. If you fail to attend a meeting, or you cannot answer questions verbally, you will be given a zero. While AI is useful, it is silly to attend a class where you have no intention of acquiring new information.
- **Electronics:** students may not use electronic devices during the class period without approval. Ear phones are never permitted during class time.

You earn your grade; that grade is entered. Grades are updated bi-weekly (sometimes sooner if there is less reading involved).

- Quizzes: The instructor will administer 13 (may drop a quiz) quizzes. Should a student miss a quiz deadline they will be required to submit outlined reading notes for the chapters covered before they can make up the quiz.
- ❖ Exams: There will be 3 exams. These exams account for 35% of your overall grade. The final exam will not be cumulative. Exams will consist of a combination of multiple-choice and short-answer or fill-in-the-blank questions. Make-up exams will be allowed with prior notification, but may require documentation. Students wishing to take a make-up exam must apply to the instructor via email. There are no make-ups for the FINAL EXAM.
- ❖ Assignments: There will be 6 video assignments/assignments to supplement student knowledge and understanding. Assignments have a greater weight than a single quiz because there are fewer assignments than quizzes. It would be best not to attempt to offset a zero. Late assignments will receive an automatic deduction of ten points each day they are late. No assignment will be accepted 3 days after their due date.
- **Attendance:** Attendance is crucial to succeeding in this class.
